

Animal Emergency Center Exotic Animal Service
Visit Checklist

PLEASE BRING:

- Travel enclosure
 - Small to reduce motion inside
 - Lined with paper or cloth to absorb spills and urine
 - Padded with towel if necessary
 - Smooth-walled to prevent chewing or climbing
 - Dark to reduce visual stimulus and fear
 - Covered with blanket for quiet and insulation
 - Secure to prevent escape
- Blanket
 - Large enough to wrap carrier and maintain temperature inside it
- Water bottle or water dish – empty or partially filled for long distance travel
- Usual caging, or if too large, photos of regular enclosure at home
 - Do not clean – leave dirty dishes & substrate/papers in place
- Food
 - 3 to 5 day supply
 - Usual familiar diet from home especially perishable and favorite items including live insects, vegetables, and hay
- Records
 - Copies of veterinary medical records
 - Logbooks of home health care and weight
 - Exotic Animal Service Patient History form (download & print)

 - Food
